ARTICLE I

SECTION 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

SECTION 4. The House of Representatives shall choose their Speaker and other Officers, and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

SECTION 5. The House of Representatives may determine the Rules and Proceedings of its own House, and may punish its Members for Disobedience of its Orders, for Unruly and Disorderly Conduct, and for Contumacious Refusal to obey its just and reasonable Orders, and may, by a two thirds Vote, expel a Member for Breach of the great Principles of the Constitution.

SECTION 6. The Senate shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for a Term of six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Representatives.

SECTION 7. The Senate shall have the sole and exclusive Power of trying all Cases of Impeachment. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. The President shall sit, and be tried, in the Senate.

SECTION 8. The Congress shall have Power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes; to borrow Money on the Credit of the United States, to emit and put to Pass, and to receive and regulate the Value of Money, and to fix the Standard of Weights and Measures.
